Education & Public Programs

16,525 children of all ages participated in our school and summer programs.

Our programs served 20 public schools from the City of Richmond, 29 from Chesterfield County, 14 from Henrico County, 24 private schools, 38 daycare/preschool facilities, six university classes, five Girl Scout and three Cub Scout troops, and 24 schools from areas beyond the Richmond metro area.

The History Center could not offer the variety of programs we do without the contributions of our college interns and our dedicated volunteers. Eleven college interns logged 1,400 hours, and 53 invaluable volunteers provided more than 4,200 hours of service.

The ten school programs offered are: A Colonial Community, African Americans in Antebellum Richmond, Children in the House: Growing Up in the 1800s, Civil War Spies, Era Explorations, Fall Line City History, Greek by Design, Hands on Richmond History, Powhatan Indians and Whose Hat is That? For anyone who remembers history lessons being vapid and tedious, think again. Through its educational programs for youth and adults, the Valentine Richmond History Center delights in making history fun, exciting and engaging.

More than 16,000 children participated this year in our school and special summer programs, offered both in-house at the History Center and through outreach visits to schools. Our programs served public schools, private schools, daycare/preschool facilities, university classes, and Girl Scout and Cub Scout troops.

We're interacting with Richmond-area students in a variety of ways so we can best reach all students. Thanks to several instructional grants, the History Center conducted free outreach programs for at-risk preschool students, free in-house programs for elementary classes, and free outreach multi-media programs to area middle and high school students.

No matter what the interest of school classes might be, the History Center has a program to meet that pursuit. From in-depth examinations of the experience of children in the 1800s to espionage in the Civil War, the school programs are vibrant and fun. Our education programs support the Commonwealth of Virginia's Standards of Learning for History and Social Science, English and Visual Arts.

When summer arrives, the learning continues with an entertaining twist. Programs offered this summer included: *History Mystery, Hoops and Hopscotch, Party in the House, Whatchamacallits & Thingamajigs,* and *Who's Hat is That?*, among others.

The History Center is also proud to enable teachers to make history come alive for their students. We provided presentations on identifying and planning field trips to student teachers at Virginia Commonwealth University, and we worked with the Virginia War Memorial to present a Teacher Institute on the Richmond Homefront during World War II.

The History Center's **adult programs are equally robust** and served **2,746** people this year, not including the 1,490 Wickham House Tour participants. The Adult Outreach Lectures were incredibly popular and thanks to supplemental funding from The Community Foundation, we were able to create additional programs to meet the need.







Richmond History Tours

In 2011-2012, we reached out to the public in a whole new way ... and had tremendous success. Through viral-marketing publicity on Groupon, chatter on Twitter, and updates on Facebook, we spread the word!

In 2011-2012, more than 10,000 people participated in more than 300 History Tours led by more than 30 guides.

Richmond History Tours are a well-known hallmark of the Valentine Richmond History Center and are just one way we show our commitment to the revitalization of the Richmond area. Each year, we continue to expand and develop the program as the tours grow in popularity.

In 2011-2012, trained and talented tour guides led tours across our town, on foot and by bus, for a few hours or a whole day. As in years past, we offered the ever-popular Hollywood Cemetery tours, Monument Avenue Holiday Glitter tours, neighborhood tours, river tours and even a History Hounds tour for our canine companions.

Seven new tours were added to the roster this year including: Raiders of the Lost Lock (walking tour of Lock Island), Henrico's African American Heritage and a Director's Tour of Libbie and Grove.

Between the sesquicentennial of the Civil War and the recent filming of Steven Spielberg's movie "Lincoln," our tour guides naturally saw an increased interest in the Civil War tours and were expertly able to weave production filming notes into tours of the Capitol.

The mission of the History Center is not simply to share lessons in history, but to **engage, educate and challenge** its diverse audience. And to meet this mission, the History Center is perpetually in motion with new exhibitions, new acquisitions and new programs.

With exhibitions ranging from the roles and sacrifices of Richmond residents during World War I and World War II to the impact made by local volunteers and philanthropists who have worked to change our community, the History Center is proud to tell a variety of stories through its objects. During 2011-2012, visitors to the History Center observed through photographs the development, Henrico County and strolled among party attire worn by two centuries of Richmonders.

Acquiring new objects that represent all facets of Richmond's history is a vital part of the work of the History Center, and in 2011-2012 the History Center acquired 853 objects including furniture, costumes, letters, documents, paintings, photographs, and tobacco items.

However, it's not all about acquiring ... it's also about sharing the items we own. The History Center loaned several objects to institutions near and far. Our items traveled a few blocks to the Executive Mansion and the Science Museum of Virginia, across the state to Abingdon, and up the coast to Massachusetts.

Collections & Exhibitions

New Exhibits in 2011-2012 included:

- Into Focus: Henrico County through the Camera
- Richmond Comes Together: Images of Community Outreach

The History Center staff continued to digitize and catalog tobaccorelated items, thanks to funding from the Universal Leaf Foundation. Nearly 2,000 cigarette cards and 200 photographs were uploaded to the online collection database.

Valentine Richmond History Center images were included in a variety of publications, including Faces from the Past: Forgotten People of North America by James M. Deem, The Civil War and American Art by Eleanor Jones Harvey, and Richmond – One of America's Best Tennis Towns by Eric Perkins with Tom Hood and John Packet.

Special Events

The first "Community Conversation" of the 2012 series took place on February 2, 2012. Over 125 individuals attended to hear Dr. Michael Blakey review findings and observations from his lifetime of research around race and culture.

The 25th Annual Court End Christmas hosted its largest audience to date. More than 1,000 men, women and children participated in this Richmond holiday tradition. Nine historic sites partnered in the event.



Cocktail parties, carriage rides, and compelling conversations are just a few of the ways the Valentine Richmond History Center is going beyond its steady stream of tours and exhibits.

As part of the Future of Richmond's Past initiative, the History Center collaborated with the Future of Richmond's Past, Leadership Metro Richmond and TMI Consulting to host a series of monthly public meetings in the spring of 2012. These "Community Conversations," are a citywide effort to **engage audiences in a dialogue** about the region's past and how that past can **positively shape our future.** Initial conversations focused on race, the Civil War and civil rights.

Throughout the year, special events, acquisitions, gifts and exhibitions occur and the History Center is always eager to play a part. In 2011, the History Center was proud to accept the gift of the pride flag from the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond - a gift that reflects the growing diversity, respect and sense of inclusion in our community. The History Center also leaped on the bandwagon – quite literally! – to partner with the Hilton Garden Inn Richmond Downtown to bring the museum's Miller & Rhoads department store delivery wagon back into public view.

As the Valentine Richmond History Center consistently demonstrates, history is not a dusty, boring old book. In fact, in the spring and winter, history is a party! This year, the History Center joined other historic sites in the Court End neighborhood for the third annual Secret Garden Party and the 25th Annual Court End Christmas.



Financial & Development Notes

Exhibitions, educational programs, affordable ticket prices, and acquisitions are just a few of the tangible ways that donor gifts impact and improve the work of the Valentine Richmond History Center.

Donor gifts represent a significant portion of our annual budget, and we are profoundly grateful to all of our individual, foundation, and corporate donors. In 2011-2012, the History Center received \$550,138 through 714 donations to its Annual Giving campaign, as well as \$545,855 in other gifts to support education, collections care, tours, and other special projects and programs.

Additionally, we continue our work on the Second Century Campaign, a \$7.5 million capital campaign to renovate the galleries and public spaces, install new exhibits and establish a supporting endowment. Altria Group provided a \$375,000 gift to help fund "This is Richmond, Virginia," the new long-term exhibition that will guide visitors through the city's history from its founding to present day.



The Valentine Richmond History Center has been collecting, preserving and interpreting Richmond, Virginia's 400-year history for more than a century. Located in the heart of historic downtown, the History Center is a place for residents and tourists to discover the diverse stories that tell the history of this important region.

The Valentine Richmond History Center opened as a private museum in 1898 and over time, it evolved from a general art and history museum to one focusing on the life and history of the Richmond region.
