Researching Enslaved Individuals Internship

Position Description: The intern will work with the City Historian to begin creating a compendium of the names of all of the hundreds individuals enslaved by the Wickham family. The Wickham family lived in the Wickham House (built 1812-1814), which later became The Valentine's first museum building. The project will span at least three properties owned by the Wickhams in central Virginia, including the Wickham House, Hickory Hill Plantation, and James River Plantation.

The intern's work will include visiting archives in Richmond and Charlottesville in order to document archival resources (transportation to locations outside Richmond City will be provided).

The name collection project will formally begin during the intern's work period, and the intern will have the opportunity to help inform some elements of the project. This project will not be completed in one summer and is part of a much larger exploration of the lives of individuals enslaved by the Wickhams, including extensive additional research and collaboration with descendants. This intern's work will establish the foundation for the reinterpretation of the Wickham House and the memorialization of those enslaved by the family. Collecting this information is labor intensive and requires both thoughtful analysis and routine completion of repetitive tasks.

Duties Include:

- Visiting archives in Richmond and Charlottesville and photographing historic documents
- Uploading and organizing photographs to the museum's digital records according to internal standards
- Analyzing historic documents and organizing their data in a spreadsheet or similar organizational tool

Qualifications include: Interested candidates should be highly organized, detail-oriented, skilled at reading cursive handwriting, patient, and critical thinkers. This work requires both thoughtful analysis and routine completion of repetitive tasks. It will involve sorting through large amounts of data to find information and meaning.

Applicants should have demonstrated experience conducting archival and/or genealogical research, including documenting and analyzing primary sources. Prior experience doing this work in service of Black history is excellent, but not required. This experience may be for coursework or from previous jobs or internships. Please enclose a writing or project sample that demonstrates this experience using the online Internship Application.

Junior, senior, or graduate student applicants preferred.

History, Black/African Studies, American Studies, and similar majors preferred.

Wage & Hours: Grant funded stipend available in the amount of \$1500.00 per semester. Flexible schedule, approximately 10-20 hours per week.
