


"Go To Richmond!" Instructions for a Go-Fish Like Card Game

Game Objectives: Students will try to match as many Richmond History Makers, Flags and State Symbols as possible. Students will review social studies curriculum while looking at primary sources and will have fun! 2015 and 2023 SOLs : 1.2, 1.3, 1.5, 1.11, 1.12, 1.13 *Based on VDOE SOL Crosswalk 2023* Instructions: To be played in a group of 5 or fewer students.


- 1. Deal each player 5–7 cards, depending on the number of players. The remaining cards are placed face down on the map of Virginia in the middle of the players as the draw pile.
- 2. Take turns. Either the youngest player or the player to the left of the dealer goes first, and play continues clockwise.
- 3. Ask for a card. On their turn, a player asks another player for a specific history maker, flag or symbol card, such as "Do you have any Pocahontas cards?" The player asking must already have at least one of the requested cards.
- 4. If the player being asked has the card, they must give it to the player asking. If they don't have the card, they say "Go to Richmond."
- 5. If a player is told "Go to Richmond", they draw a card from the draw pile. If the card is the one they asked for, they can match it with their card and put down the match in front of them, cards facing up. Then their turn ends. If the card is not what they asked for, they keep it and their turn ends.
- 6. End of game. The game ends when all sets have been laid down, or when the draw pile is empty. The player with the most matches is the winner!



City of Richmond

The capitol of Virginia, officially founded in 1737. Located at the Fall line of the James River.



L. Douglas Wilder

Former Mayor of Richmond and Governor of Virginia. The first African American to hold statewide office in Virginia.

Pocahontas

Daughter of Chief Powhatan, major player in the early relations between Native Americans and English Settlers, in the 1600s.

Eastern Tiger

Swallowtail

Designated as the State Bug

in 1991.

Chief Powhatan

Leader of the Powhatan alliance of Native American tribes, who lived near the falls of the James.



Maggie Walker

The first woman in the nation to charter a bank and to serve as its president. A prominent activist in Richmond, in the early 1900s.



Progress Pride Flag

Visit the Valentine to see the flag flown by the Federal Reserve Bank in 2011



Chesterfield **County Flag**

Includes the year of the county's official founding, 1749.

Big Eared Bat

Designated as the State Bat in 2005. Today, only about 20,000 remain.



MIIK

American Foxhound

Designated as the State Dog in 1966.

Milk

The State Beverage, designated as such in 1982. Of the 32 states that have a state beverage, 20 of them chose Milk!







GOTORICHMOND! Teacher Key



Barbara Johns

Led a student walkout in 1951, aged 16, to protest school conditions. The case that followed was crucial to the Brown v. Board of Education decision.



George Washington

Delegate of Virginia. Commander in Chief of the Continental Army, and the United States' first president.

Henrico County Flag

Adopted in 1984. Includes a depiction of Pocahontas.

Thomas Jefferson

Primary author of the Declaration of Independence, and the United States' second vice president and third president.

Arthur Ashe

Professional tennis player and activist. The only black man to ever win men's singles at Wimbledon, the US Open, and the Australian Open.

American Flag

Adopted with its current 50star design on July 4, 1960.

Richmond City Flag

Adopted in 1993. Represents a person navigating a boat down the James River



Virginia State Flag

Officially adopted in 1912 and standardized in 1950.



Dogwood

Oyster

Virginia's State Shell, designated in 1974. Today, it is at risk due to over-farming and climate change.



Virginia State Capitol Building

Designed by Thomas Jefferson. Completed in 1788.
