Collections & Exhibitions

During this past fiscal year, the Valentine completed a 16 million dollar renovation and expansion. Our collection spaces now boast a state-of-the-art storage system, new reading and public access rooms and dedicated work spaces. The majority of our collection had been offsite since 2022, and with the completion of construction we have finally begun repopulating. Finishing construction has also meant reopening all of our exhibition spaces, once again allowing us to share changing exhibitions three times a year.



With co-curators Josh Epperson and Kate Sunderlin, PhD, and in partnership with Studio Joseph, this exhibition represents a huge investment in seeking truth together with the Richmond community to learn more about our rich and often difficult history.
